Septic loan system expands to Glocester businesses, non-profits, Valley Breeze

To prevent further contamination of the Chepachet River, Glocester is expanding its Community Septic Loan Program to include owners of commercial, non-profit and mixed-use properties in Chepachet . . . The money comes from a low-interest line of credit from Rhode Island Infrastructure Bank, which the town then lends out to the property owner at 2 percent interest over 10 years.

Brownfields Revolving Loan Fund to finance environmental remediation work in the building, to bring the building up to standard, and to remove and transport asbestos from the property.
